Outpatient entry , Patient referral, management and appointment were entered through this module. Through this module ,with the use of IT facility Teaching and Learning programmes are implemented in an innovative way with effective utilization of Smart Board classes. Account module is linked with TALLY 9 Software for effective Accounting and Auditing procedures. Library module is linked NIRMAL PRO 6.1.0 Software, where e Resources are available to enable the students a speedy and convenient access to library journals through EBSCO. Other Resources like Pubmed , Medline etc. can be accessed in the campus through Broadband based LAN connection and Specific WIFI Hotspots. Curriculum module is uploaded with the instructions given by Statutory bodies like Dental Council Of India and The Tamil Nadu Dr MGR MEDICAL UNIVERSITY. Time table for all years, Syllabus and Teaching Schedule with Specific Lesson Plans for all the years are incorporated in the module with specific task assigned to the individual faculty. Feedback can be given by the individual students to the staffs by accessing through their USER Id. Examination module is uploaded with</p>

schedule of University exams, terminal exams and periodic assessment exams carried out by individual departments. Result analysis in terms of number of students passed , failed , absentees and number of students achieved First class and distinction along with overall pass percentage , overall topper ,subject wise topper can be obtained in an Statistical format by using examination module. Through the Certificate module by raising a request a student can easily download the photocopy of their submitted certificates like transfer certificate, community certificate, nativity certificate, No objection certificate for participating in Co and Extracurricular activities, Authorization certificate and Leave request. Application for Scholarships for eligible students can also be downloaded through this module. Through the college website linked with CIS, one can able to access the details of Quality policy and Objective, Vision and Mission , Accreditation details , Admissions regarding BDS , MDS Courses ,details regarding the departments , Services offered , Faculties with their Scientific presentation ,Publication , Information regarding campus and Infrastructure , Sports and Games , Journal , Special Services like AADHAR and Gallery uploaded with details of Curricular and Co curricular activities. The faculty and Student Module can be accessed by their individual Login IDs and they can apply and cancel leave requisition , permission , On Duty and Week Off. CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The Institutional Board of Studies (IBS) housing the academic cell and the

examination committee, adhering to the goals and objectives of the institution, frames the curriculum in accordance with the TNDr.MGRMU and recommendations of Dental Council of India, as our institution is affiliated to the same university that has developed and reformed the syllabus based on the feedback from its constituent colleges so as to reflect the national needs of the profession. At the commencement of BDS/MDS courses, a well-planned orientation program is conducted and presented by the Head of the Institution to enable the candidates to understand the course subject for each year. Since 2019-2020 the curriculum for BDS/MDS courses has been restructured by the experts of concerned specialities to educate and train the students enabling them to acquire adequate theoretical knowledge as well as the necessary practical skills. This helps students to accomplish awareness for performing activities appropriate to the general dental practice spanning over various facets including prevention, diagnosis and treatment of various anomalies and disease conditions of oral, paraoral and dental tissues. The institution's regulations also train students to understand the concept of community oral health by posting them in health care delivery programs existing in the country. Clinical postings with demonstration of each procedure to the students and with appropriate case discussions are scheduled to enable students to complete the assigned quotas for the academic year and a feedback is collected at the end of each posting. Clinical performance evaluation is carried out at the end of each posting and thereafter necessary reforms are undertaken in each department. Three internal assessment exams as per TNDr.MGRMU guidelines are conducted simulating the university exam patterns. Students are regularly encouraged to attend seminars, workshops and conferences (National and International) with presentations so as to update their knowledge on the subject and also to hone their presentation skills. The institution has provided a well-equipped and updated library to enable students to have access to referencing tools, database, journals and literature to help sharpen their knowledge. Postgraduate students and staffs are provided with user id and password to facilitate e-consortium so that they can access all journals online. The third term of the academic year since April'2020 has changes in the academic activities due to the pandemic COVID19 lockdown. The undergraduate students being managed with regularly scheduled online lectures and assignments. Tests and model exams are also being conducted and feedback collected from students. Postgraduate students are also scheduled with online seminars, journal clubs, assignments, model exams and tests and are also encouraged to attend regular webinars at National and International level. A regular monthly progress report is being submitted for all postgraduate students to the PG committee to analyse their work status. The post graduate students are assigned peripheral posting as recommended by TNDr.MGRMU by many departments so that students gain additional indepth knowledge of their specialities. Overall the undergraduate and postgraduate students are encouraged by the institution to perform short studies and original research work which has to be approved

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

Feedback is an essential part of effective learning helping students to assess their level of understanding the subject and guide them to improve their learning. A regular and spontaneous feedback collection is practiced in our institution as an integral part of performance review, which is also vital to the institution's ongoing development. Feedback is collected in organized format from students, parents, patients, teachers and the institution alumni. Student feedback is collected every term for teaching and learning processes and thereafter analyzed and the necessary improvement implemented. The student's feedback data for theory and practical classes were collected manually on yearly basis. The data collected were analyzed by the faculty in charge to plan the corrective action measures for the faculties with low percentage of scores. Based on the severity of the issue, the corrective action measures were directed against identification of the root cause with periodic monitoring of the progress. The remedial measure for low feedback percentage were training related to teaching and learning methods and training related to implementation of innovative teaching methods by Dental Education Unit for the enrichment of students attention and knowledge. Based on students feedback, theory and practical term exams were restructured, clinical demonstration of the procedures were reinforced before clinically treating patients for both undergraduates and postgraduates. Innovative and clinically useful workshops and symposia were organized in selected topics as per the feedback from post Graduates. Parent feedback is collected every term during PTA (Parent Teacher Association) meetings and thereafter scrutinized and reported to the principal and management for necessary action towards improvisation of their studies and well-being and for implementation of remedial measures if necessary. In this regard, the student mentors keeps a constant communication with parents regarding their ward's academic and clinical Performance, patient and task management skills, attendance and ways for further improvement. Patient feedback is collected to assess their satisfaction on patient care system and treatment procedures from all concerned departments and thereafter examined by the feedback in-charge and report submitted to the HOD and Principal for necessary action. Patients Feedback is mainly based on NABH Regulations and separate patient care team collects the feedback from patients without revealing the identity of patients during grievances, thereby avoiding bias and

compromise in treatment procedures and follow ups. Feedback are obtained at the end of each scientific deliberation, i.e. CDE, seminars, symposiums, rapid review programs, from the speakers, invited chief guests and also from the examiners and thereafter feedback will be closely studied to assess their scale of satisfaction so as to improvise on the techniques suggested. Participants of all CDE programmes, work shops and sensitization programmes are also advised to give their feedback regarding the event. Online feedback and appraisal of the faculty are received through the college system. Feedback from alumni is also collected during every alumni meeting and alterations made as needed. An overall positive feedback of students and parents for 2019-2020 has resulted after analysis which has been submitted to the Principal and thereafter forwarded to the management.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Student Mentor system in Adhiparasakthi Dental College and hospital had attained an outstanding milestone by delivering a well established guidance, encouragement and a definitive parental care for every student throughout their Dental course. The mentor committee is governed periodically by the IQAC cell and constantly been motivated for its newer upgradation and improvements. The mentor committee in our college comprises of 33 individual mentors, eight overall academic year mentor, two mentor coordinators, committee members, member secretary and Mentor committee chair person. The committee had a definitive plan of action for every academic year which will be always focused upscale aimed for cumulative improvement in the overall committee performance every year. All the mentors were allowed to freely interact and establish a rapport with their allotted student mentees and assess their academic and clinical performance , clinical quota completion, attendance and other mentoring parameters to establish well organized and optimal level of mentorship program. Each individual staff mentors will be collecting a Term-wise assessment data sheet from their respective mentees to witness the overall performance of the student, and based on which an appropriate action plan and measures will be prepared and executed. The mentor committee also welcome students queries, doubts, complaints, suggestions and even an personal problems which interfere with their academic performance and activities, the committee cumulatively collects all the above mentioned grievances and the same will addressed in the mentor committee meeting and an appropriate solution or action plan will be discussed and upon Principal approval, the later will be implemented for the benefit of the students. The committee also consist of a clinical Psychologist team to render an effective behavioral and psychological counseling to the student who are in definitive need. As a annual plan, mentor committee also conducts Parent-Teachers meeting at the beginning of Third term for the benefit of the student and further improvise the overall performance of the student in final university exams and to reinforce it further, feedback were collected from both parents and student to superimpose the further upgradation and improvements in the committees overall success. In COVID-19 lock down period also our college mentors were effectively establishing contact with their respective mentees and their welfare assessments were collected via online platforms. Their feedback pertaining to online classes, online webinars and seminar, overall integrated online college activities were done periodically collected. The slow learner were given additional attention and their performance were reinforced by the mentor committee. Apart from the regular academic activities, mentor committee also deliver additional guidance program for higher studies, certificate courses, entrepreneurship, extra-curricular activities and honors a overwhelmed Dental education for each and every students.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The overall attitude and communication skill is ascertained by OSCE/OSPE patterns for Term III - through Google classroom platform focusing the regulation given by MGR University. However, the final diagnosis should be obtained using a systemic approach. The counselling skills and the ability to arrive at the accurate

treatment plan is also assessed. The behavior of the students, the chair side manner he/she exhibits are all recognized in this system. The Feedback for examination and question papers were collected by the examination committee for the UG PG scope of education. The Postgraduate basic science model examination along with the clinical examination was conducted as per the guide lines given by examination committee. The examination committee as continual improvement measure has proposal to conduct the monthly class test from the academic year 2020 - 2021 as measure to standardize the protocols in identification of slow learners. It is imperative that the slow learners are not discouraged. Ideal to respect them and believe that each one has a special ability that can be can be dwelled upon, not all students can succeed in the same way and it is best not to overwhelm them in the process of learning. Extra hours are spent with the slow learners and repeated review sessions held to facilitate enhancement of their memory. The slow learner's identification has been initiated with corrective action and updated to the members periodically by the subject in charges and if it persists again periodically the work performances updated to the parents periodically. The students interest and enthusiasm in acquiring knowledge and practical skill is assessed during the course of the whole year. Internal examination marks are allotted to make sensible and sensitive assessment of the students dedication to acquiring knowledge. Hence the final outcome is based on the students performance in the final theory , practical and viva exams plus his average performance throughout the year.

The two practices of decentralization and participation are performed under the two committees 1. MRD Committee: functions with a Chairperson, Convenor, Quality manager, MRD incharge and members from all the department. Committee meeting was conducted monthly once. Partial automation is followed in MRD where card entry , Bar coding system and the time patient come in to department and the procedure he/she has undergone and the future follow up and appointment are maintained in the form of e governance. Patient care persons are appointed they will be attending the patients, guiding them to the departments, appointment remainder through telephone and patient feedback where obtained by them. Card audits are conducted daily by the staffs based on rotation to check the entries made in the Outpatient card are checked, any entries which doesn't follow the protocol that has to be followed in the entry will be noted and informed to the concerned department. Random card audits are done three month once to improve the standardization in outpatient card. In the next academic year we are in progress of converting it into fully atomized version. 2. PG Committee: It aims to foster and improve post graduate education and to ensure that DCI norms for Post Graduate students is maintained. The committee is comprised of a chairperson, Member Secretary and Representative members from each of the post graduate departments. It monitors the work progress of the post graduate students every month and ensures students maintain a minimum of 80 attendance. The committee meets thrice in a year and makes amendments as the need maybe. It encourages students to take up researches and participate in scientific deliberations. Institutional Board of Studies (IBS) conducts meeting in the beginning of year were all the Heads of the department handling dental and basic medical science will attend the meeting and the time table for the academic year based on the number of hours allotted by the DCI will be framed. Academic cell ensures the smooth conduct of curricular activities of the institution.

Research and Development

Research committee constantly aims to improve the standards of scientific research in our institution. Every year selected major projects are funded through CLB trust . In this academic year 13 projects are funded . Innovations are yet another area to be focused in a higher educational institution. In this year new Vshaped plate was designed after successful completion of finite element analysis started in the department of oral surgery with a clinical pilot survey. We applied for patent it has been published in the Indian Patency Journal and its under review. Our aim is to improve the standard of publication focusing on pubmed /SCOPUS/UGC listed journals. With minimal targets which can be achieved and mutually benefit the researcher and society. 14 PG major projects have been submitted.

Human Resource Management

A transparent system in the recruitment of staff is adopted by the Staff Selection Committee comprising of Correspondent, Principal, HR Manager

and Respective Department Heads. The staffing pattern is in accordance with the statutory body recommendations. Other ministerial staffs in sufficient numbers are also appointed for smooth and efficient functioning of the institution.. Employee welfare schemes are implemented for the benefit of teaching nonteaching staffs. Facility management team conducts fire drills to train staffs and students to act at the time of adversities. Hepatitis B vaccination given to all staffs and non teaching staffs in particular are vaccinated with TT injection. Gender Sensitisation committee against Sexual Harassment ensures a safe working environment for the staffs students. A proposal to initiate a Staff welfare committee for the overall benefit of teaching nonteaching staff is under way and will be established shortly. Institution enables its staffs to revamp their teaching skills and stay update with state of the art facilities by arranging many faculty development and training programmes.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

APDCH library spans over 8700 square feet with special provision for digital library comprising of 25 computers printing facilities, AV room, separate UG and PG reading sections and a seating capacity of 320. Exhaustive collection of books and journals with back volumes are available. It is partially automated with Central Intelligence Software. Remote access to e-resources were enabled for uninterrupted learning during the tough COVID times. Library advisory committee runs a stock verification for both department and central library to ensure proper maintenance and efficient functioning of the library. Four new-age airconditioned smartboard classrooms enabled with ICT devices and internet services with a facility to store backup lecture classes are available. A dedicated IT team is available all time for assistance. Institution is well equipped with state of the art lab facilities. Nemoceph, a software for cephalometric analysis that enables hassle free cephalometric tracing treatment planning of ortho patients and Trios-3 shape intraoral scanner in AAADAR facility offers digital accuracy limited manual errors

thus improved patient experience care.

For final university examinations and terminal exams two sets of question paper prepared and safely stored as soft copy, 10 minutes before the exam and in the presence of principal exam superintend open the galley with protected password and download the question paper. Then it will be photocopied and issued to the students. Examinations were closely monitored with CCTV and are lively

connected to the university controller of examination can be viewed lively for final university exam. The marks are documented in CIS and regular PTA meetings are conducted to inform the parents regarding their wards academic progression.

Planning and Development

We have attained NABH accreditation for all departments (included in scope of services). IQAC framed and started monitoring the activities of MRD committee, infection control committee, Purchase Condemnation committee. NABH assessment was conducted by Dr.Ketham, NABH assessor and gave feedback regarding our facilities and also advised about the steps to be taken for further improvement on (9/12/2019 10/12/2019). The QMS integration in our dental college is helping to improve the scope of service to comply with internationally recognized quality standards. For continuing our drive towards GO GREEN CAMPUS, environment days was conducted on 5/6/2020 and all the outgoing and incoming commutations (external internal) were uploaded in HIS portal and were made visible and accessible to all stake holders. Effective patient management system has been planned and is under progression. MRD Department was fully automated by installation of bar coding of OP case records and patients review /appointment card (made entry, retrieval of OP card, referral to departments made easy), computerized billing for payments, Radiological investigation (made account auditing easy) customized portal for staffs and students were created and linked with our college web site. Through CIS Faculties were given the access to view their attendance, leave schedule. They can upload and update their individual competency matrix, publications, conferences and conventions attended/presented/organized etc., in the respective profiles thus minimising paper work and files to store these data physically.

Administration

Our campus administration system is maintained by Central Intelligent System(CIS). Faculty schedule and their duties are evaluated. Consumables and non-consumables are maintained manually and planned for online management. All

departments were updated with high speed internet facility and live monitors/screen. Daily activities like faculties(presence/absence), student attendance, teaching schedule with in-charge staff, important proposed activity as per calendar schedule. IBS adjusted the curriculum to involve the basic medical science departments also in teaching and evaluating the 1 year PGs along with lecturer in biostatistics and research methodology. As per the revised MDS course regulations released on 26th august 2019 and published in the gazette of India (part 3, section 4). IBS has revised DCI MDS curriculum by discussing with all basic science and dental departments.

total of seven patients after careful clinical examination and necessary investigations including complete blood picture, ECG, chest X ray, Echocardiogram, Contrast Enhanced CT scan and with the discussion with Expert oral oncology surgeons, appropriate treatment was advised. Based on the expert opinion, two cases were referred for palliative care considering the patient's physical status and disease stage. Five patients were planned for surgical management of the primary disease which included wide local excision, neck dissection and reconstruction and performed the same. Free dental implant placement camp A team of specialists from Department of Prosthodontics and Department of Periodontics planned and executed treatment of implant placement to 20 patients. Twenty poor and needy patients for oral rehabilitation were selected and evaluated for general status and other necessary investigation were completed. Surgical procedures were planned on the day and executed with utmost care and concern to the patient. The uniqueness of camps conducted by our institution is that people who are in need but are unaffordable were provided with required dental care, thus allowing all the health care systems available to everyone. All the patients were grateful in receiving free treatment and whole heartedly thanked the management for this noble initiative.
